Transvaluing

It has been 30 years since I read the magazine column about increasing my vocabulary. Yet, I continue to enjoy learning new words and the nuances of the English language. One word to hit the bright lights of renewed usage is "transvalue." It, like many European words, migrated into American English in the early 20th century, and it appears to have taken a sabbatical for the last 100 years. Now, it is returning to the language workforce. Its definition reads "To evaluate by a principle that varies from accepted standards" or "to re-estimate the value of something especially on the basis differing from accepted standards." Now, let's apply this word to church life.

When John Wesley recorded his Aldersgate experience in his journal on May 24, 1738, the worship life of the church was centered in cathedrals, chapels, and other institutional church halls. Based on the events of that night when "I felt my heart strangely warmed," he transvalued English worship life and experience from sanctuaries to the streets and fields. There were times Wesley stood on the street corner loudly singing "Praise God, from whom all blessings flow," and at the end of the doxology, he announced preaching would begin at this location at an hour later in the day.

Preaching and worship followed this or slight variations of this in the pioneering era of the United States. Worship and preaching formats incorporated hymns, Scripture readings, prayers, sermons, and the usual elements in venues ranging from church halls to dance halls, from street preaching to store fronts.

Today's Christians find we are mid-stream in another transvaluing era of worship. One can easily find churches constructed to look like a business rather than a church. The interiors require more than pews and pulpits. Rather, it's "lights, camera, action" with any number of musical instruments. And, this is just the tip of the iceberg in the current transvaluing of worship. There is more, and it is complicated. In the book *Worship Ways: For the People within Your Reach*, authors Tom Bandy and Lucinda Holmes point out that one size does not fit all. Church services to reach a new generation must be created with an intentional style. Bandy and Holmes identify seven:

- 1. Coaching Worship
- 2. Educational Worship
- 3. Transformational Worship
- 4. Inspirational Worship
- 5. Caregiving Worship
- 6. Healing Worship
- 7. Mission-Connectional Worship

To determine the worship brand best fitting for a specific congregation, Bandy and Holmes advocate utilizing socio-demographic data in worship planning. Lifestyle information supplies the basis for a congregation to offer worship to address the fundamental issues for the people who are within reach.

Finally, here is good news for our church. Our Church Council has organized a task force to review worship options and opportunities in our church. The task force is studying Bandy and Holmes' book as a resource for their work. It is an exciting thought that our congregation's leaders and people will discern how God is leading us in transvaluing worship at First United Methodist Church for a new generation of Christians who are within reach.

degree in music with an emphasis on vocal performance from the University of Alabama in Birmingham, a M.A. degree from Samford University with an emphasis in choral conducting, a M.S. degree from Samford University in secondary education, and a MBA degree from the University of Denver with an emphasis in organizational leadership and human resource administration.

Originally from Birmingham, David has studied choral conducting with Robert Shaw of the Robert Shaw Chorale. He has many ideas for developing the presence of the arts in our church so that it becomes the premier site for ecclesial artistic expression in our region.


May 2: Learning to talk about race: examples, experiences

Mission Corner (Community & World Outreach Committee)

Kenya Projects

Since 2010, FUMC has been a faithful partner with other USA churches, the Methodist Church in Kenya (MCK) and most recently, Rotary International in building clean water and hand-washing projects at more than 55 primary and secondary schools. Our GBGM Advance #3021424 has attracted investments from individuals and churches across the nation. We have resources now to reach about 30 more schools. All the schools are identified and prioritized by the Bishop of the Kaaga Synod in Meru, Kenya. The leaders at each of the schools have requested that clean water be brought to their school and they each have made some sort of significant investment of their own in their project.

The Clean Water movement is part of a larger international effort known as WASH (water, sanitation and hygiene) because all three elements are critically linked in communities trying to improve their human health. FUMC has joined this approach by agreeing to add the third element, sanitation, to our work. Improving sanitation can be done in a variety of ways but is best when tailored to the needs and resources of a particular location.

We have also participated in developing a concept gaining worldwide traction known as Holistic WASH. This concept constructively addresses key three issues in developing nations. One is the WASH hardware (water filters, hand-washing stations and latrines). Another is educating school children about personal and community hygiene. This includes our helping to build school libraries and computer teaching centers. Still another is youth training and employment about WASH with the expectation that unemployed youth can start a business building WASH projects elsewhere in their country. Thank you to FUMC for your long time passionate interest in this work. Your commitment is making a positive difference.

Summer Bookmobile

The FUMC Summer Bookmobile began in 2012 at the request of Putnam Elementary. June-August we load the church van with crates of books and drive to low income neighborhoods designated by the school. Our volunteers help kids choose two books of the correct reading level to borrow each week. A grant was given by Group Publishing last fall to build a small trailer, so that novels can be organized but not unloaded at each neighborhood stop. We also received a generous trailer donation from an anonymous church couple in 2014. We've designed our own trailer. Components are being purchased and assembled! We will need a large number of volunteers weekly at our largest Hickory Village trailer park site, which serves 50 kids or so. A day and time for that stop are not set, but will likely be Tuesday evening or Friday just before lunch. We are hoping to develop a facebook page and twitter feed to be able to communicate schedules, changes, and highlights. 

Following is a reflection from Alyssa Jenkins, a CSU 2015 graduate and regular attendee at FUMC, about her third trip to Guatemala with Wesley Foundation this past March.

Guatemala has changed my life in more ways than one. This past March was my third trip to Guatemala. The trip always puts me out of my comfort zone- whether it be the spiders, the uncomfortable beds, the language

barrier, or the fact that you can't flush your toilet paper... But I think that's what we need every once and a while. I need to be pushed out of my comfort zone and be able to experience a different culture to grow in myself. These trips have also helped me expand my vision of God. He's working in more than just my tiny life in Fort Collins. It's a beautiful thing to be able to connect with the people of God in a whole different part of the world- we are all children of God even if we don't speak the same language or live the same lifestyle. The people of the country are what keep me coming back. The people of Lemoa have great hearts and always welcome us with open arms.

Thank you for your faithfulness in giving! Do you know all the options available to you in making your financial contributions to the church? As check writing is on the decline, we have added convenient ways for you to support the ministries of our church.

- 1. Electronic Funds Transfer You authorize the church to deduct a specified amount out of your bank account monthly.
- 2. Online Giving Go to fcfumc.net and click on the tab "Give Online". You will be directed to a secure website where you can enter a one-time or recurring contribution from your bank account or credit card.
- 3. Mobile Giving Download the "Joyfully2UMC" app from the app store and enter Fort Collins First United Methodist church. Or, simply scan this QR code with your mobile phone and you will be directed where you enter your giving information.
- 4. Credit Card Swipe your credit card and enter the desired amount on the dedicated iPad located at the Welcome Center.



Don't forget to place a "I Give Electronically" card (found in the pew pockets) in the offering plate as it is passed when you use any of these forms of payment.
