MESSAGE FROM REV. MELANIE ...

"Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?" Isaiah 43:19

God is doing a new thing at First Church, something with much promise and potential. From the moment I arrived last summer I learned of the need for an alternative worship service to better serve our diverse community. We offer outstanding traditional worship week after week, but this style of worship does not appeal to everyone. High quality worship services, no matter what style, do not come to fruition easily, and require thoughtful consideration and planning. Creating such a service has been one of my top priorities in the last year. I have been reading, listening, and learning. I have spoken with many people, attended several alternative worship services here in Fort Collins, and watched others online.

An alternative to our current Sunday morning worship services offers our best opportunity to attract new people, while better serving our current members. We are blessed we are to have found such an outstanding Worship Leader in Joseph Noelliste, who will bring us creativity, professionalism, and impressive musical ability, which is what we are accustomed to at First Church.

Starting a new worship service is similar to launching a new church. It is a process which requires time, energy, money, and support in order to flourish. Like anything new, it will be fragile for a while, and we need your patience and prayers. Whether or not you plan to attend the service, this is a major initiative of our church, and positive support from all of us will be critical to its success.

There are ways in which this service will not satisfy everyone. Some will dislike the day and time. Others will dislike the location and the format. Some will have specific expectations for such a service that will not be met. I ask you to please suspend

criticism and give this new thing a chance to succeed. After thoughtful and careful assessment, in consultation with many others, what we have created is the very best we are able to offer in this place and at this time. The new worship service will begin Sunday, September 9 at 5:00 pm.

Please pray for this service and support it as enthusiastically as you can, whether you attend or not. Invite your neighbors and friends, furthering our efforts to reach new people with the transforming love of the God we serve. And continue to support the mission and ministry of our church as we seek to make our circle of love wider and wider still. Thank you!



STATE OF THE CHURCH REPORT BY Rev. MELANIE ROSA

On Sunday July 1, I gave a state of the church report regarding all that God has done among us in the past year. There is so much to be thankful for, and I was asked to include some excerpts from that sermon in this edition of the Carillon. Since July, 2017 we have seen a 33% increase in worship attendance and a 16% increase in giving. We have been able, so far this year, to tithe \$23,000 to the denomination, after tithing very little last year.

After hosting several Exploring First Church classes, we have received 38 new members, many of whom have become very involved in our ministry.

We have had 12 baptisms, including 10 children and 2 teenagers. We celebrate 3 weddings this summer within our church family. We have greater interest and involvement in mission and outreach, more authentic engagement with our neighbors in need both near and far away.

Barb Grauberger joined our Staff team to lead newly invigorated Children and Family ministries, with new Sunday curriculum and 130 kids in Vacation Bible School. Rebecca Dunagan has led our youth in faith development, mission and service, with 15 students being Confirmed into membership in our church. Scott Grantland came to lead the Wesley Foundation. Catherine Pawlikowski joined us in the areas of Membership, Finances and Volunteer Coordination. And we welcome Joseph Noelliste, our Modern Worship Leader who will help launch our new service next month.

We will offer groups this fall to enhance our spiritual and discipleship formation so that we can grow into spiritually mature Christians. With the help of your elected Lay Leaders we are working to clarify our mission and vision become more nimble and flexible administratively. There are many other signs of new life and transformation taking place, with God's guidance and grace.

However, we cannot become comfortable or complacent. Comfortable churches are closing all the time. We need to keep growing, moving, reaching out seeking new ways to serve and bless others. We need to be hungry for the life changing power of God that first changes us and then changes the world. We have to tell our story more effectively and enthusiastically, to let the world know of a loving, life giving God that we find in Jesus Christ.

There is a significant niche for an intelligent, inclusive, progressive, large membership Christian church in a University community where ALL people are welcome all the time. Please commit yourself to go deeper in your faith, through prayer, study, worship and service as we work together to build a vibrant and vital church for those who follow us. It is an honor to serve in ministry with you.


YEAR-LONG BIBLE STUDY: The Grand Sweep (by J. Ellsworth Kalas)

SMALL GROUPS THAT CREATE COMMUNITY



marthaconant@gmail.com) to create your unique commitments for the next 3 months. Participants in The Path will meet


on Wednesday evenings from 7-8 from September 5 through November 14 as a small group or in a one-on-one meeting with the Path Guide.

FINANCIAL PEACE UNIVERSITY



Our church is interested in helping people with every area of their lives, to find the peace of mind and freedom that God intends for us all. Yet 76% of people live paycheck to paycheck and 24% of their paycheck is spent paying off debt. The average household debt is made up of approximately \$187k mortgage, \$30k student loans, \$17k car loan, and \$5k credit card debt. This is nearly a quarter million dollars of debt. Would you be interested in an approach that has helped nearly 100% of 5 million people pay off their debt, save \$2,700, and creating an emergency fund of \$1,000

in 90 days?

Our Stewardship and Generosity Team will sponsor Financial Peace University this Fall. Participants do not need to be members of the church, since we hope to better help the entire Fort Collins community by being more active in serving all those who are struggling with their finances, which if we're honest, includes almost all of us.

It will begin on Wednesday Sept 5th at 7:00 PM and end on November 7th and will be held in the second floor Village Commons room. No meeting will be held on Wednesday October 31st due to Halloween. Each session includes a 1-hour video and ½ hour for discussion.

Cost will be \$109 per family (single person or a couple with or without children under 17). WEDNESDAY BOOK STUDY AT NOON

Diana Bass's timely new book, *Grateful: The Transformative Power of Giving Thanks*, will be the subject of the noon Wednesday book study throughout September.

Although most of us know that gratitude is good – and good for us – there is gap between our desire to be grateful and our ability to behave gratefully. The implications of the gap are bigger than we realize, affecting both our personal and public lives. In *Grateful*, Bass weaves together social science research, spiritual wisdom, and contemporary issues as she calls for a richer understanding and practice of gratitude. What emerges are surprising insights about the power of thankful living to change how we treat one another, and how we might transform the world.

WORLD WISDOMS PROJECT BY DAVID REID



Dr. Tink Tinker, professor emeritus of Iliff School of Theology, will present "Stories of Spiritual Journey: Practices in the American Indian Tradition" at 6:30 p.m. Sept. 13 at First Church. This is the first World Wisdoms Project (WWP) program for 2018-19 and is co-sponsored by First Church.

Tinker, an Osage tribal elder, will share personal stories of American Indian spiritual practice whose goal is to balance the community with its world. A sharp contrast will emerge with our contemporary American culture of individualism and competition. That dichotomy has caused great devastation to other cultures and to our planet. The question will be raised as to whether a change in our contemporary starting point could provide the secret to our survival and sustainability as a people and a planet.

Tinker taught at Iliff from 1985 until his recent retirement. He has taught courses in American Indian cultures, history, and religious traditions; cross-cultural and Third-World theologies; and justice and peace studies. His most recent publication is *American Indian Liberation: A Theology of Sovereignty*.

In the Fall of 2018, WWP's "Shared: Stories of Spiritual Journey" will focus on experiences, pilgrimages and sacred destinations in the American Indian, Jewish and Christian as well as the Buddhist and Islamic traditions. The Winter-Spring 2019 program will focus on the moral growth toward the care of the "Other' in the Jewish/Christian traditions and ethical growth toward the care of "Mother Earth" in the Buddhist and Humanist traditions. The 2019-2020 programs will explore images/names of the sacred, spiritual experiences of mystery and awe, and the sacred /secular dialogue.

CAN WE TALK ??? BY CHURCH AND SOCIETY COMMITTEE

The Church and Society Committee invites your participation in a series of three roundtable discussions on the important issue of how our faith affects our participation in the contemporary political scene. The Committee believes it is timely for our community to explore just how being disciples of Christ makes a difference in how we assess our political choices.

Roundtable #1 on August 19, starts with the assumption that we all follow the same Lord. With this assumed, we'll explore the phenomenon that Republicans, Democrats Independents and whatever other self designations there might be sit comfortably together in the same pews. Is "faith" so unimportant? Is political ideology a preeminent concern?

The premise underlying this discussion is that the objective is not for someone to persuade someone else that this or that position is the "right" one. Faith is a matter of belief.

In a short essay called "Don't Believe Everything You Think", Michael Josephson says: "All our beliefs are essentially opinions as to what is true and the intensity of our convictions does not increase the likelihood that we are right. Sincerity is a demonstration of honesty, not objective truth."

Our intent is for all to listen and hear. It is a certainty that Christians sharing openly together can emerge with fuller understanding of our own belief systems, and a better appreciation of why someone else believes differently.

VIETNAM BIG BUILD – NOVEMBER 1-11 BY JIM COLLINSON

From the land of kings to fields of lotuses, the Vietnam Big Build 2018 will take place in Cao Lanh District, Dong Thap Province, about 100 miles from Ho Chi Minh City (Saigon). Dong Thap Province is considered the "Rice bowl" of Vietnam. However, the population of more than 1.6 million is at risk from annual flooding. Such natural disasters make these agriculture-dependent families – who earn less than US\$100 a month –



vulnerable to falling back into poverty. Habitat for Humanity Vietnam has been helping families in Dong Thap to build a better life for themselves since 2011.

Erika Nossokoff, Faith & Global Engagement Manager at Fort Collins Habitat for Humanity, will lead our team of 13. This includes 7 from First Church. We are part of the "Vietnam Big Build" during which dozens of teams from around the world will travel to Vietnam during the same week to build more than 20 houses. In addition to building a house for a family, we will build relationships with Vietnamese people and learn about their culture.

Making a Difference in Kenya with Days for Girls Project \overline{DAYS} $\overline{\underline{For}}$ BY KATE NORTON



Did you know that over 1.2 million girls in the world have no access to sanitary products? Consequently, these girls miss up to 3 months of school every year. Many of these girls end up getting behind in school and ultimately dropping out. This is a sad situation that can be easily fixed with our help!

For the last two years, a dedicated group of women at First Church has been busy making reusable Days for Girls sanitary kits (www.daysforgirls.org) that have been well designed by the Days for Girls organization. Seventy-five of these kits were distributed in Kenya this spring while First Church members were on the clean water mission trip and the girls were absolutely thrilled! We have had many requests for more kits and need more help getting them made. For anyone interested, please join us for a **September 18 training session** from 9 am to noon. During the training session, we will provide general information on the program and then split people into groups to train on how to make specific components of the kit. Do not worry if you cannot sew. You can either be trained on how to sew or help cut materials and add snaps. Once you are trained, you have the option of working from home when it is convenient for you or you can join us at the church at our regular sewing sessions (2nd and 4th Tuesdays from 9:30 am to noon).

In addition to cutters and sewers, we would love to have materials donated for the project. The materials needed are as follow: sewing machines, sergers, medium dark to dark patterned durable 100% cotton or cotton/poly fabric, medium dark to dark patterned durable 100% cotton flannel fabric, grosgrain ribbon and polyester thread. Please avoid fabric prints with eyes, faces, animals, people, guns, camouflage, hunting, flags, pop culture and words on them. Any donated materials can be dropped off in the Fellowship Hall in the Mission Corner.
