Join Josh at the Bas Blue Theatre (401 Pine Street) on Friday, October 12 at 7:00 pm.

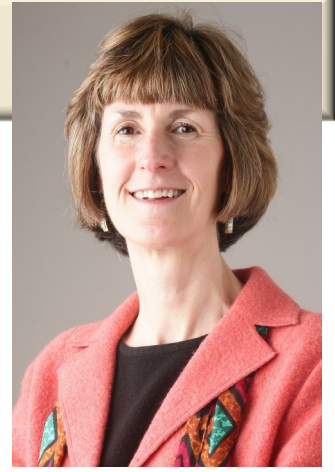


ANNUAL CHILI COOK-OFF SUNDAY, OCTOBER 28 6:00 p.m. FELLOWSHIP HALL

Message from Rev. Melanie, Lead Pastor...



In recent years scientific studies on the effects of religion have shown that going to church is good for you. Worship attendance boosts the immune system and decreases blood pressure. It may add as much as two to three years to your life. The reason for this is not entirely clear, but my guess is that peace of mind and social support are significant factors. A regular spiritual practice reduces worry, anxiety and fear, thus enhancing overall quality of life. One study shows that people who attend church regularly have larger social networks, more interaction with, more affection for, and more varieties of social support than their un-churched counterparts. Social support is directly linked to improved health, both physically and emotionally. Whatever produces such positive results is certainly worthy of our time and attention.

And yet, as with any other interaction, maintaining closeness with God is an intentional, ongoing process. It requires discipline and practice. It requires constancy in good times and bad. If it is not a priority in our lives, it will easily fall by the wayside. I hope you will make your relationship with God through our community of faith a top priority. Your relationship with your creator is the foundation for every other relationship, and will give you deeper appreciation of your many blessings, as well as the strength to cope with the losses and setbacks life sends your way. A strong spiritual foundation ensures that your reserves of patience, peace, hope stay replenished.

Your church staff and lay leaders are working hard to offer many opportunities for you to grow spiritually. With 4 Sunday worship services, a wide variety of classes, studies, mission and outreach experiences, music ministries, as well as fellowship, there are multiple ways to get involved. By far the most important is regular worship, as studies have also shown that worship attendance is not only the key measure of a church's vitality, but the most tangible sign that its people are growing in their knowledge and love of God. Dr. Lovett Weems writes: "Worship is the exposure to the beauty of God in Christ." The more often we are exposed to that beauty, the more beauty we will discover in the world around us.

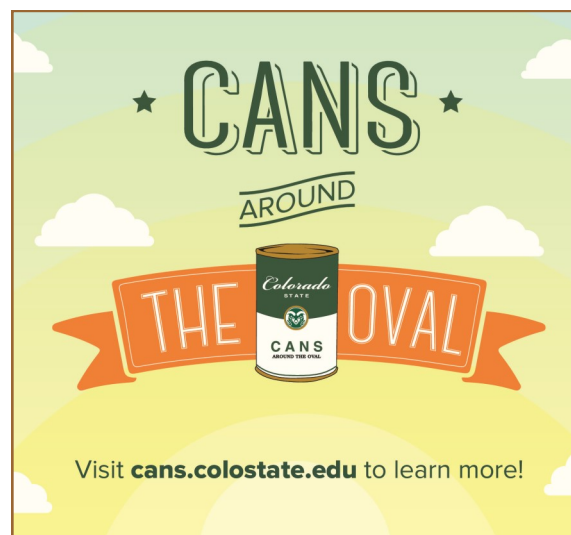
All Church Food Drive Cans around the Oval

CROP Walk for Hunger 1 pm, Sunday, October 7th Communities Responding to Overcome Poverty

It's a fun occasion as people of all ages from many faith communities, with dogs and strollers, in tennis shoes and roller blades, join in this annual event! Meet at 1st Presbyterian Church, 531 S. College Ave. at W. Mulberry Street for registration & instructions at 12:30 p.m., Sunday, October 7.

Walkers gather sponsors (non-walkers) to support their walk and the donations are divided so that ¼ goes directly to Food Bank for Larimer County for local programs and ¾ goes to Church World Service (of which the United Methodist Church is a member). CWS uses the donations to eradicate hunger and poverty in the US & around the world through emergency and disaster relief, and education and resource programs.

A Presbyterian church, in an effort to bring Christian unity and peace, thought we needed a Sunday where all who were Christians could gather at the table for the Holy Communion and remember we were one. Now, more than 80 years later, World Communion Sunday celebrates our inclusivity and diversity. As we break bread together, we remember that we are still one body in Christ, even though we speak different languages, have various cultures and traditions as well as different ways of praying, and worshipping.

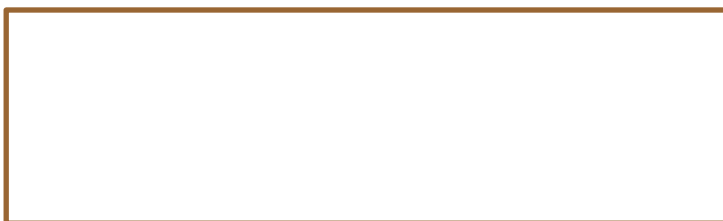
