rom February 23-26 a special session of our United Methodist governing body will meet in St. Louis, Missouri. The purpose is to finally decide where we go as a denomination regarding the issue of the full inclusion of LGBTQ persons in the life of the church. This is the endgame in a conflict that has spanned

decades and caused too many people to walk away from the United Methodist Church altogether.

There are several proposals before the General Conference, and the option most widely supported by both

moderates and progressives is the One Church Plan. It has been endorsed by our Council of Bishops and denominational leaders. It would remove restrictive language from our Book of Discipline, and allow churches and Conferences to decide for themselves the approach they would take. But supporters of the far more restrictive and punitive Traditionalist Plan are unwilling to extend full inclusion and support to members of the LGBTQ community. They justify this with a selective Biblical literalism, taking some passages quite literally and others not so much.

It is entirely possible that the church will split after this meeting, and our mission in the world will suffer. Ours is the only church in the top 5 denominations to affirm women's ordination, and to have an organizational structure which allows for a wealth of resources that independent churches lack. Our Committee on Relief is a missional jewel that other denominations admire and emulate. Our theology is practical, sensible, and inclusive. In approaching God, we combine head and heart, social action and personal piety. United Methodism is a shining example of the best of what Mainline Protestantism has to offer. We stand for unity but not uniformity, believing we do not need to think alike in order to love God and neighbor well. The impasse over homosexuality is incapacitating our broader mission, and makes the UMC look like a lumbering dinosaur, out of touch with reality. All means ALL, no exceptions. Every person is sacred and loved in the sight of God.

John Wesley once wrote: "It is only when our love grows cold that we can think of separating from our brethren. The pretenses for separation may be innumerable, but want of love is always the real cause; otherwise they would still hold the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace."

Whatever the General Conference decides First UMC will stand for full inclusion for all people. That is non-negotiable. We warmly welcome and accept everyone, including our LGBTQ brothers and sisters who have been hurt and marginalized by the church for far too long. I am praying that we do not have a church split later this month. But if we do, our church will continue to stand on the side of justice and love for all people.

The Roots of Methodism in Colorado - Norma Cowell

n 1858 and 1859, the discovery of gold drew thousands of people to Colorado. Gold was found in paying quantities close to Denver and Central City. Coming West were not only lawless adventurers, but also many people from Christian homes. Among the gold seekers were a few lay preachers, who were not official representatives of their denomination. One of these was George Fisher, a lay Methodist preacher, a carpenter and a wagon maker. General Larimer, recently arrived, arranged for Fisher to hold a service in a two room cabin owned by local gamblers.

The first religious work, authorized by a denomination, occurred in the Denver area and Central City by Dr. William Goode and Reverend Jacob Adriance, sent here by the Kansas-Nebraska Conference. Arriving in Denver June 28, 1859, they preached morning and afternoon in the



unfinished Pollock Hotel. After preaching on July 4th, they left for the mountains where they held services in the vicinity of the current United Methodist Church in Central City. The next day Dr. Goode and Reverend Adriance convened a quarterly conference and organized the Methodist Church in Central City. This was the first official church of any denomination in the Gold Rush region. George Fisher, the lay minister, was left in charge.

Next, they went to Golden, Colorado where they organized the Methodist Church after a service conducted in a gambling tent. Returning to Denver on August 2, 1859, they founded the Denver and Auraria City Mission, now known as Trinity United Methodist Church.


Dr. Goode, who was a much older man, then returned to his home in Iowa. Reverend Adriance, referred to by many as the "Father of Methodism in Colorado" remained. Fifty years later on June 28, 1909, Reverend Adriance, then a tottering old man, was brought to Denver from his home in Nebraska to preach the same sermon for the second time.



United Methodist Women

he February 14th meeting for United Methodist Women will have Theresa Holbrook speak about her many trips to Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in South Dakota. Theresa made her first trip to Pine Ridge in August, 2009 with Jon Loughlin as a team leader. Since then she has organized and led groups including the recent December trip to share early Christmas with the Lakota.



Pine Ridge Indian Reservation is located in the poorest county in the United States with high unemployment (80%), poverty, corruption, addiction, and a sense of hopelessness by many.

In spite of the problems that exist, the Lakota have many positive attributes: generosity, courage, reverence for God's creation, perseverance and a reemerging sense of pride in their language, crafts, and tribal traditions.

Theresa will share about our church's mission trips to Pine Ridge and what is done there with the people as well as inform us about the many interesting sites on the reservation such as Oglala College, Red Cloud Indian School and Heritage Center, Wounded Knee cemetery, buffalo herds, the Badlands, and more. Our church has contributed in many ways and she will make us aware of how we have helped.

Most importantly, she will be telling us what she sees as their greatest needs and how we can help and learn when we visit.

Please join us for lunch at 11:30 in the parlor followed by this program by Theresa. In the Lakota way of life, Wakan Tanka is the term for the sacred or divine, often translated as "The Great Spirit", and Wakan Tanka Kici Un means "May God Bless." Come to be blessed by good food, good fellowship, and learning more about the Lakota and Pine Ridge Indian Reservation.
