It Takes a Whole Congregation

As I write this today, November 7th, I am already thinking about Christmas. In fact, planning for services on Christmas Eve and Christmas Day started last summer. Tens of dozens of people contribute to developing and delivering Christmas worship events. Once, I tried to count the numbers of individuals and

teams behind the scenes who prepare for weekly Sunday Services. It takes the labors of over 125 people (from opening the church doors to pronouncing the benediction near the noon hour) for each Sunday morning to happen. Beginning with custodians who work all week as evangelists to have the

building bright and inviting, our list can include everyone and every group from the choirs to the Board of Trustees. In the next 6 to 7 weeks, here are some of the groups and individuals working for this to be the best Christmas ever. Do not take this list as final; so many are giving and doing I am sure to miss someone.

It takes the labors of over 125 people (from opening the church doors to pronouncing the benediction near the noon hour) for each Sunday morning to happen.

- A mass of volunteers who set up the fellowship hall, hand out bells, clean pews between services, set the Altar table for communion, assemble candles, hang greens for Advent, usher, and greet and more.
- Choirs and musicians who offer their talents.
- Custodians who tend the building for our guests.
- Members who work to welcome our guests.
- The Board of Trustees who coordinated the installation of parking lot lights. (This year, instead of the construction-grade generators blaring to power exterior lighting, the "Silent Night" we sing in the services will be a reality in the parking lots.)
- Church Council who discussed and voted to approve parking lot lights.
- The Worship Design Team who oversees the execution of Christmas Eve.
- Staff who do everything from recruiting nursery workers to creating and printing bulletins.
- Marketing people who develop advertising.
- Pastors who prepare sermons and liturgy.
- Lay readers in worship who lead prayers and read Scripture.
- Church members preceding us (many now deceased) who provided the pews we sit in, the hymnals we sing from, an organ we are inspired by, and a building in which we are housed.

After reading this list, I am asking you to find a place to serve. With so many guests attending our church on Christmas Eve, it is the prime moment for us as church members to be welcoming hosts. Our Christmas Eve guests may decide to come back to First United Methodist Church permanently. You are probably familiar with the African proverb, "It takes a village to raise a child." Here is another. It takes an entire congregation to hold a worship service.

On the first Sunday of every month we gather as a community of faith to worship and celebrate Holy Communion. On that one Sunday the children are not excused from worship to attend Sunday school. But we'll also be asking the Wesley Foundation folks for ideas, and the Senior Council as well. And, of course our music leaders are making plans for ways to enhance first Sunday worship as well.

So, be sure to mark first Sundays so you can attend worship and see what's happening. Who knows? Maybe you'll even make new friends from generations other than your own!

Darkness and Light

am struck by how humanity tends to structure their narratives as a cataclysmic struggle between two opposing forces, one characterized as "good" and the other as "evil." From the ancient Sumerian creation stories that tell of the struggle to vanquish Tiamat, the goddess of chaos and destruction, to George Lucas' Star Wars movies, which tell the tale of the struggle to overcome the "dark side of The Force" by using the powers of the "light side," this

theme echoes through millennia and cultures around the world.

And so I find it fascinating that the story of our faith does not follow this narrative. In fact, it stands in stark contrast to narratives that set up opponents.

This was not always so. In the third century a Christian leader named Mani cast the Christian story in terms of an epic battle between a dark Lord and the God of Light. The dark Lord had captured particles of light from God and was using them to control humanity and the created world for his own ends. All human actions were framed as a choice between darkness and light, good and evil, right and wrong. Other Christian leaders eventually rejected this understanding of our faith, but the essence of this teaching can, as we have seen, be found in our world today.

The Manichean world view was rejected because it is contrary to what is so clearly true in our Scriptures. From Genesis to the Gospel of John, the Light of the world is not at war with darkness. Light overcomes darkness simply by being Light. There is no battle when God creates light in Genesis; the light simply exists and dispels darkness by its nature.

In the same way, when God saw the world was full of darkness God did not go into battle with humanity. God instead chose to be born as an infant, bringing the Light of his goodness and love into the

material world through his physical being. While Jesus worked to do good during his lifetime, his greatest accomplishment was to show the power of *being* good. Even death could not conquer the Light of goodness and love, for it is eternal and beyond the confines of this material world. And the miracle of Christmas is that the Light exists within each of us.

As you move through this season of celebrating the birth of God as an infant, I invite you to remember that the Light of goodness and love is still at work in the world. There is no need to struggle and fight for anything. Simply seek to be good as he was good, love as he loved, and the work you do will bear fruit even as you experience the joy of God's love more profoundly each and every day.

Holy Dreamers

n November 4th through the 6th, I had the honor and joy of accompanying 6 students to the Imagine What's Next Conference in Atlanta, Georgia. This conference, put on by the UMC National Collegiate Ministries, invites current university students from all over the nation to think about the ways that God is speaking and calling to them, whether that be in the church specifically or how they can put their faith in action in their studies.

On the second day of the conference, a speaker talked to us about the story of Joseph from Genesis. He told us that Joseph was a "holy dreamer", a person who received a dream from God and acted on that dream even though his family disapproved. That night, as I encouraged students to talk about what dream God had for them, the answers varied from global evangelism and missions to teaching middle school. The

students were inspired by what they had heard both from speakers and from Methodist students from around the nation that they were able to meet, and they had many ideas about how God might be calling them to act in the world.

On the third day, Bishop Sandra Steiner Ball from West Virginia again asked the 300 students gathered there to consider another holy dreamer: Joseph, the husband of Mary. To a chorus of amens, she elaborated the ways that Joseph took risks in following his dream from God and invited us to imagine what could be achieved if all the students who were gathered there took the same risks. It was a deeply

inspirational moment to look over all the crowds of Methodist college students, gathered in Atlanta from places as far reaching as Hawaii and Maine, and imagine the potential for world change. Seeing those students being filled up with God and empowered to go and do likewise was a spiritual experience for me.

In this Advent season, may we be holy dreamers. We can sit patiently and wait for God's dream to be fulfilled in Jesus Christ, and we can also imagine to possibilities that happen when we not only dream, but also go and do what God has called us. Christ has entered the world and enabled us to dream holy dreams, may we take that call responsibly.


