Message from Melanie

What are you giving up for Lent? While it is a well-meaning inquiry, I must confess that do not find this question especially helpful as the Lenten Season begins. Giving up something for Lent feels like a hollow ritual from a long-forgotten era. Bishop Mel Wheatley has helped me to consider a question for Lent that I find much more provocative. Bishop Wheatley wrote:

"One of the heresies of a distorted Protestantism is the belief that one can be devout without being disciplined. The removal of external requirements is translated into the elimination of internal controls. The fact that one is not required to confess one's sins is distorted into the fallacy that there is no need to confess at all. The lack of any rules is cheapened into a bland indifference about all things spiritual. The fact that one is not required to give up anything for Lent is interpreted to mean that one need not take on anything for Lent, either. It all adds up to a flabby faith and a counterfeit Christianity."

Attempting to be all things to all people, the church in recent times has too often offered cheap grace and superficial spirituality. In our desire to attract more members we are tempted to minimized the demands of the Christian life, marketing discipleship as something effortless and comfortable.

Lent is a time to go deeper, moving beyond superficial Christianity into more meaningful faith development. It is a time to reflect upon what following Jesus really requires and how his suffering is a universal metaphor for the suffering of everyone. It is a time to confess the ways we have failed--God, ourselves, and others. It is a time to consider sins of omission and commission--those things we have done and those things we have left undone.

As we journey through the season of Lent together this year, I would invite you to go deeper by taking something on. You might want to take on the discipline of fasting, contemplative prayer or tithing. It may be the discipline of simplicity, study, or obedience. It may be service, sacrifice, sharing your gifts with others.

You are also welcome to give something up, just make sure it is something that is indeed a sacrifice and reminds you to reflect upon God's love as revealed in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. Whatever you choose to take on or let go of, I hope that Lent will be a time for us to deepen our shared faith as we grow into the likeness of Jesus Christ.



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The 2020 Grant Program of the Foundation for the First United Methodist Church of Fort Collins will begin on March 1st. Grant money is available for church committees and groups to be used for programs, equipment and services that are typically not funded through the church operating budget. The Foundation was begun in 1986 and has distributed approximately \$386,000 in grant money since that time.

Grant Application Timeline

March 1-31: Grant applications may be found online on the church website or picked up in the church office. Applications will also be placed in committee mailboxes.

March 31: Deadline: Completed grant applications must be returned to the church office with the necessary signatures and placed in the Foundation mailbox.

April 22: Review: The Foundation Board will review each application and determine this year's recipients.

After May 1: Notification: Grant applicants will be notified as to the status of their application.

The Foundation Board will review each application to determine if the request should be fully funded, partially funded or not funded. In general, the total amount requested for all grants far exceeds the funds available.

Each grant application requires signature approval and the signatures must be obtained prior to submission to the Foundation. Unsigned applications will not be considered for funding.

JOYCE E. McConnell, President of Colorado State University, will deliver the 2020 Richard Hagen Lecture at 7 p.m. April 14 in the Sanctuary. Her topic is "We Must Rise Together to Rise."

CSU is celebrating its sesquicentennial only months after First Church turned 150 years old, making them two of the enduring institutions of Fort Collins.

McConnell is the first woman president in the university's history. She has worked as a lawyer, professor, dean and provost before becoming president.

In September, she announced an initiative to address issues of race (and racism), bias, and equity at CSU.

"Every single member of our community deserves to know that they are welcomed and valued for every aspect of their identity, race, gender, religion, ethnicity, immigrant status, socioeconomic status, disability, age or veteran status," McConnell said at her November inauguration. "They deserve a place where there is no question, theirs or anyone else's, whether they belong because they do."



Named provost of West Virginia University in 2014, she fostered the expansion of WVU's Energy Institute, ADVANCE Center and Center for Excellence in STEM Education. To elevate connections among disciplines critical to analytical thinking, problem-solving and understanding the human condition, she established a Humanities Center.

The Hagen Lecture is funded by an endowment of the Adult Faith Formation Committee. It honors the late Richard Hagen, a member of First Church and exemplar of lifelong learning. There is no admission charge for the lecture but donations to the endowment fund are encouraged. Checks designated for the Hagen Lecture Fund also may be sent to the FCFUMC Foundation.
