

The financial figures in this article are totals of giving through First United Methodist Church from many sources. Donations through the general offerings and the church's budget are included. Additionally, there are other sources.

s one year ends and a new year begins, reports on the ministries of First United Methodist Church are reviewed from my desk. One of the areas I am most interested in seeing is how we are serving and helping others. A fair amount of this comes through our congregation's committee we call Community and World Outreach. In 2016, we gave a total of \$44,006.13 to mission agencies (e.g. Habitat for Humanity, Buckhorn Camp, Larimer County Food Bank, Putnam School and Bookmobile). This does not include gifts from the Ken Makinen Bequest, nor does it include contributions by Sunday School Classes. It does include "Dollars for Mission". This amount is a big increase over the previous year.

Here is how much we have grown in twelve months' time. In 2015, we gave \$21,970.46. Again, this does not include bequests or mission projects sponsored by Sunday School Classes.

This doubling of giving to local charities does not come singularly from "Dollars for Mission". It does come *because* of "Dollars for Mission." With everyone in worship being asked to give one extra dollar and all loose unidentified dollar bills placed in the offering plates being forwarded to other mission agencies, we have publicized the continuing work of missions in the church. Dollars for Mission was in place for 8 months of 2016 and brought in gifts totaling \$5,786.00. Dollars for Mission gave more than dollars. It communicated the need for generosity and giving to serve others.

For 2017, I am setting a goal of \$10,000 for Dollars for Mission. And when we reach year's end, I expect we will have given more than we gave in 2016. Again, the increase will be seen primarily *because* of Dollars for Mission. Have a wonderful new year!

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The Future of the Church

n all the talk about numbers – both finances and people – it's easy to lose track of the "why" of it all. Why does the Church exist – not just First UMC, Fort Collins, but any church? We have a beautiful vision statement, but what does it really mean?

It is our vision to be a community of faith as loving and considerate of

persons as Jesus. How do we become a community of faith? If you only worship once a month but never challenge your mind through a class; if you attend a Sunday school faithfully but never worship or attend a children's program, are you fulfilling the vision? If you are so concerned that someone will be upset that you rarely voice an opposing opinion, are you being loving and considerate? Jesus worshipped often, and immersed himself in studies prior to his ministry. Jesus challenged people, but never walked out on them. Are you willing to do the same?

.. as devoted to justice as the Old Testament prophets. The Old Testament prophets did more than scold people – their strong words about justice invariably called people to authentic, heart-felt worship; to obedience to God's will as understood through study of the Torah, participation in community, and regular prayer and worship; to a deep practice of kindness grounded in the humility of knowing you can never really know your strongest opponent's heart; to an understanding that the most vile person you have ever met and who has harmed you is loved passionately by God and will be forgiven without God consulting you.

.. as responsive to truth as science. Science is based on discovering truth, not declaring it. Truth is true whether it is believed or not. And the truth of God is a richly colored, deeply textured fabric to be explored endlessly by the human mind without any possibility of knowing all of it with certainty. Are you willing to be wrong about your most deeply held beliefs?

.. *as beautiful as art.* Difficult to define, art might be best defined as an expression of authentic inner experience in a manner that is engaging, compelling, difficult to ignore. Is the way you live your outer life an authentic expression of the love and grace you experience through the Christ that dwells within you? Do you seek to match your words to that love? Are your clothes, car, job all means by which you can communicate the deep goodness of the God you know?

The future of our church lies less in finances and volunteer hours doing good works than it does in how we wrestle with and answer these questions, for these questions drive us into God's presence.

.. as intimate as the home. Perhaps the Quakers do this best with the questions they ask families to embrace: "Do you make your home a place of affection where God's presence is felt? Do you practice family prayer? Do you share your deepest beliefs and interests with all in the family? Do you grow together through sharing prosperity and adversity? Can you keep a sense of humor and avoid taking yourself too seriously? Do you establish family standards including the mutual obligations of children and adults?"

... and as indispensable as the air we breathe. Are you participating in the life of this church in a way that makes the love and friendships found here indispensable in your life? Are you participating in a way that offers friendship and love to all who enter the church whether to participate in meetings, classes, events, or worship so that they are drawn by love back to our doors? The future of our church lies less in finances and volunteer hours doing good works than it does in how we wrestle with and answer these questions, for these questions drive us into God's presence. Only there will we discover the strength and courage to be the Church, eternal and triumphant.

- Prefer behind-the-scenes? We could use help with refreshing worship bags and notebooks, and restocking our Sunday school supplies.






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Congregational Care Ministries By Rev. Cynthia Paguette



- Audio Books: The library has cataloged its first audio books! Plans call for growing this collection quickly in 2017, thanks to a gift from Avis Fisher. In addition, memorial gifts to honor Betty Fischer, a longtime former chair of the library board, and her husband, Charles Fischer, have been designated for audio books. Initial purchases will be in CD format. Look for signs in the library for the audio book section.
- Luther's Works: The monumental translation project that resulted in the 55-volume collection of Martin Luther's writings are now part of the reference section in the library's study room. This addition arrives just in time for the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation, which Luther ignited in 1517. As publisher Fortress Press notes, Luther was both praised and vilified for what he preached and wrote. Gayle Abrahamson, chief cataloger for the NCFL, managed this project. The collection was donated by the Rev. Dr. Byron Swanson, former Lutheran clergyman and retired professor from Midland Lutheran College and California Lutheran University and his wife, Kathryn, a retired educator and former director of Women's Programs at California Lutheran.
- **Bible Cart**: Some 26 copies of the *Common English Bible* (copyright 2011) are available for checkout by any group that wants to use them at FUMC. There's a single bar code for the entire cart, which is stored in the library's study room. The Bibles and other *CEB*-specific reference works were designated for the library by the Memorials Committee from gifts given to honor the Rev. Jim Cowell. The beautiful blue cart was purchased with library reserve funds. Keith Metcalf, a volunteer cataloger, managed this project.

Let's Talk About Dying Well by Chaplain Kaitlin McMichael

ome 90% of Americans say that having the conversation about end of life wishes is important but only 27% of Americans have had these conversations with their families and loved ones. Have you had the conversation but don't have the legal paperwork done? Do you want to have the conversation with your older parents or your adult children but don't know where or how to start? The conversation about living well at the end of life is for everyone.



Let's Talk About Dying Well is a three- session class scheduled for 7 p.m. Feb. 7, 21 and 28. The instructor is Chaplain Kaitlin McMichael, an FUMC member.

We will discuss what is important to you and your loved ones about end of life choices and how you can begin the conversation at home. We will go through the "5 Wishes" advance directives booklet together which provides information and legal forms for appointing a health care agent and completing a living will among other end of life topics surrounding faith and spirituality, comfort, and special requests. Join us to learn how you can pass down the "prophetic blessing" and gift of offering your loved ones the assurance that they are upholding your wishes at the end of your life. Chaplain McMichael is a hospice chaplain with experience working in trauma, hospital, and hospice settings with patients and families at the end of life.

Adult Faith Formation - Richard Hagen Lecture Series by David Reid

he first Richard Hagen Lecture will be given at 7 p.m. March 9 by Bryan J. Dik, associate professor and associate chair in the Department of Psychology at Colorado State University.

Dik's lecture is titled, "Callings in Work and Life."




"The idea that work, retirement and other life roles can be a calling is making a major resurgence in contemporary culture," said Dik. "This talk will explore the convergence of new positive psychology research on calling with centuries of Christian teaching on the concept, and emphasize practical steps each of us can take to more effectively live out our callings."

Dik will discuss the concept of calling through all stages of adult life. He recently received a grant from the AARP/Life Reimagined Institute to develop and lead workshops. His TEDxCSU talk, "How to Find and Live Your Calling" is available on YouTube.

Dik is an elder (a lay leadership position) at Immanuel Christian Reformed Church in Fort Collins.

The Hagen Lecture is funded by an endowment of the Adult Faith Formation Committee. It honors the late Richard Hagen, a member of FUMC and exemplar of lifelong learning. His family, friends and other individuals and classes at FUMC have raised \$14,000 toward an initial goal of \$20,000. There will be no admission charge but donations to the endowment fund are encouraged. Checks designated for the Hagen Lecture may be sent to the FCFUMC Foundation.

Good News about Bookmobile and Putnam Elementary School


This summer's bookmobile visited neighborhoods where Putnam Elementary's students in need of reading help reside. We served an average of 76 kids per week, with 5 stops each Tuesday. We loaned out a total of 1511 books over the 10 weeks and gave away 185 books on the last week. We bought a new book trailer with grant money to ease crate-carrying by volunteers. 30 different volunteers, from FUMC and the community, gave a total of 412 hours at bookmobile stops this summer.

This semester FUMC has provided Putnam Elementary help in the following ways: a Scholastic News Subscription for 3rd Grade, Jog-A-Thon supervision, Vision and Hearing Screeners, After School Club Assistance, Good Behavior Prize Store Attendants, Classroom Volunteers at all grade levels, Gardening Day Help, one iPad Donation, Craft Project Donations, and a Staff Appreciation Proveded



Project Donations, and 2 Staff Appreciation Brunches with food and massages.

Your individual donations and adult Sunday School class generous giving will enable us to continue our good work in the above areas. Bookmobile donations will be spent on graphic novels, picture readers, and bilingual books. Mentors are helping kids with science fair projects on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons, January 24th - March 30th. Any Putnam donations will be used for project supplies and science fair boards. Last year we had mentors from FUMC, CSU and local high schools. Two of our students won awards at the District Science Fair!


