Without a Vision and With a Vision by Pastor Charles

One of the many truths I have discovered after years of pastoral work relates to the wisdom that can be discovered in reading the Bible. There are some passages I will never fully understand. (For example, Jesus said, "If they do this when the wood is green, what will they do when it is dry?" [Luke 23:31]) Still, there are verses rich with meaning. I have learned 5,000 years and more of thinking within the Judeo-Christian tradition usually produces more depth than I can conjure up from my five decades of intentional and specialized study. One verse illustrating this notion comes from Proverbs 29:18. Many memorized this famous quote from the King James translation as given below. The second point in the following section is the same text from Eugene Peterson's translation/paraphrase version, *The Message*.

Where there is no vision, the people perish: but he that keepeth the law, happy is he. If people cannot see what God is doing, they stumble all over themselves, but when they attend to what God reveals, they are most blessed.

Some mornings when my feet hit the floor, I pull myself into standing position, amble toward dressing, breakfast, and direct my attention toward whatever happens to be on my list for the day. I prefer times when my soul adopts another routine. Instead, it is exciting to awaken with energy, drive, and passion targeting my life like a beaming laser toward my calling. I have entered many days "stumbling all over myself", when it has been my personal mission to "attend to what God reveals."

Oftentimes, I passionately pursue good objectives. My desire is to be:

- A good husband, father, grandfather, and son,
- Skilled and dedicated to my profession,
- Excellent at my hobbies,
- A serious student in lifelong learning, and
- A sports enthusiast playing with finesse and accuracy.

I will, at times, lack passion toward something more essential: faith. It is not impossible that I am losing my balance because I miss neglect the ability to see what God is doing.

Here is a way I am working to improve my faith and life. Instead of bouncing from "pillar to post", I find it significant to ask: "How is God at work in this time and place?" "If [I] cannot see what God is doing...," is Peterson's way of approaching the question. A vision is more than a view into the future, and it is not only capturing lessons from the past. A vision or "seeing what God is doing" means awareness of the present. A wise pastor once told me, "There are people who entrench themselves in the past, and there are others who are solely focused on the future. If you are not living in the present, you are not living anywhere". God created the present for us to enjoy what God is doing today. Or, as Peterson completes this proverb: "when they attend to what God reveals, they are most blessed."

Here is another approach. If am constantly thinking about whatever is next (the next car, next congregation, next day, next vacation, or next anything), then I am ignoring what God is doing right now.

Recently, each person in our congregation repeatedly prayed, "Lord, what do you want to do through me at First United Methodist Church?" As I continually prayed this prayer, I found meaning in adding one word. This word prevents me from stumbling. This word provides impetus to attend to what God is revealing. Seeing what God is doing today requires vision. Now, I pray, "Lord what do you want to do through me *today* at First United Methodist Church."

Church Foundation Announces Grant Program 2017 by Stephen Zink

he Fort Collins First United Methodist Church Foundation is pleased to announce that its annual Grant Program is about to begin. Since its founding in 1986, the Foundation has given a total of over \$318,000 in annual grant money to various church committees and other groups for programs, equipment and services that are not funded in the annual budget, the results of which are both visible within our church walls as well as reaching out to impact the world around us.

Grant Application Timeline:

<u>March 1st Pick Up.</u> Grant Applications made available in the church office. Applications will also be placed in committee mailboxes in the office.

<u>March 31st Deadline.</u> Completed Grant Applications must be returned to the church office, with the necessary signatures, and placed in the Foundation's mailbox.

<u>April 26th Review.</u> The Foundation Board will review all applications and determine this year's annual grant recipients.

<u>May 2nd – May 4th Notifications.</u> All who applied for a Foundation grant will be notified as to the final status of their application.

While the Foundation would like to fully fund all grant requests, generally the total amount requested for all grants far exceeds available funds. The Foundation Board will review each application and determine if the request should be fully funded, partially funded or not funded.

Each Grant Application requires signature approval. All specified signatures must be obtained prior to the application being submitted to the Foundation. Applications lacking the required approvals will not be considered for funding.

New Youth Director and Contemporary Worship Leader An update from Pastor Vivian, Executive Pastor

ate Orr and Daphne Bear, representing the Staff Parish Relations Committee, and Pastor Vivian have been working with representatives from the Youth Council (Heidi Priebe and Allison Straubing) for several months to hire a Youth Director. At the same time Mario Sosa, Megan Wieck, and Pastor Vivian have been working to hire a Contemporary Worship Leader.

The Youth Director team has reviewed several dozen of resumes, interviewed a dozen candidates, brought three candidates to the church for final interviews, and offered the position to three candidates. All three declined our offer of employment and, frankly, in hindsight it seems that we were blessed by this turn of events. The way each turned down our offer illuminated a facet of their character that allowed the team to see that they would not have been a good fit for the position after all.

After the last job offer was declined the team took some time to prayerfully reflect about their experience to date. They then changed the job description, wording of the advertising, and made revisions to the hiring process. New candidates have applied for the position, and the team has set up initial interviews with several of them.

The Contemporary Worship Leader hiring team received few resumes from qualified candidates. The only promising candidate was one of the candidates for Youth Director who turned down an offer of employment. However, new candidates have recently been identified, and the path forward is more promising.

This is has been a long process and it is understandable that our youth and congregation have been discouraged at times. It is important that we encourage one another as the teams move forward. The teams are confident that God has been guiding this process and will bring it to conclusion in a way that will deeply bless our congregation.



Stumble or Stride?

t's that time again – the time when congregations and pastors in the United Methodist Church wait to see if the pastor will remain with them another year or be appointed to another church by the Bishop and her Cabinet.

This has been the United Methodist way of doing church for over 200 years, and for most of our history it worked well. But times have changed, and so has the United Methodist Church. The average tenure of a pastor in the Rocky Mountain Conference is now 8 years. As a result, the tension that arises from anticipated pastoral change is now much stronger within congregations as they await a possible announcement.

The tension of anticipation is present in our church now as it is possible that one, two, or all three pastors may be reappointed. United Methodist congregations, who share this cycle, have different ways of managing the tension. Some methods build up the church but, unfortunately, many common methods are both unhelpful and unpleasant, leading to a decline in attendance and giving, which weakens the church, making it harder for any future pastor to succeed.

In dealing with my own tension during these days of uncertainty, I found a passage from Eugene Peterson's rendering of the Bible encouraging. It is Proverbs 29:18. Peterson's rendering comes alive for me: "If people can't see what God is doing, they stumble all over themselves; But when they attend to what he reveals, they are most blessed."

When I read that in the context of uncertainty, I realize that God is already doing something good in this uncertain situation; I just can't see it. In my anxiety, I stumble all over myself and, sadly, sometimes over others. But I don't have to stumble; I can choose to stride into the future with confidence. My confidence is not in myself, the congregation, or even the Bishop.

My confidence is in God, who has led me through all the days of my life, and who continues to love me and lead me even now. If I turn my attention ("attend") to God, I will be blessed. It's not what I know, but Who I trust.

I invite you to trust God with me in the weeks and months to come. Let us attend to God together, and do our part to create a church culture of trust, and warmth, and blessing.


Library News by David Reid



beautiful new Bible now graces the Communion Table in our Sanctuary. The Holy Bible with Illustrations from the Vatican Library was published by Turner Publishing Inc. and Oxford University Press in 1995. It is bound in burgundy cloth and embossed with gold lettering.

The new Bible includes a color illustration at the start of each chapter and scores of smaller illustrations throughout. It is a New Revised Standard Version translation.

It was donated to the Northern Colorado Faith Library by Linda Carlson, the former curator of the Avenir Museum of Design and Merchandising of Colorado State and a member of Our Saviour's Lutheran Church (ELCA) in Fort Collins. The gift was facilitated by Jim Reid, a board member of the Theologian in Residence Program.



Pastor Charles Murry recommended that the Bible be placed in the Sanctuary, where it is not only a part of worship services but also available for viewing after most services. It replaces a well-word Bible with a broken binding. It is a New Revised Standard Version translation.



Children's Ministry Corner



Into a New Era Announces Progress by Stephen Zink and Mike Kholer

"I believe in this church and its future."

That's what supporters of First United Methodist Church have proclaimed through the commitment cards that have continued to come into the church office for the *Into a New Era* program.



Since Finance Committee Chair Dave Rubenthaler shared a progress report on January 22, commitments to the 2017-18 Into a New Era program have increased to 218 pledges totaling \$637,424. Thirty-six additional pledges for \$14,230 have been made to the Building TLC Fund. Those amounts, coupled with estimated non-commitment card giving, projects a total ministry support for 2017 of \$843,409.

Even better, a similar amount is already committed for 2018, a major goal of the two-year program. And we are only at the "end of the beginning" of the program.

Some Into a New Era progress that we can all celebrate:

Per capita giving by congregation members who pledge each year is up by nearly 12.5%.

Projected income for 2017 is on track for year-to-year growth.

Thanks to 2-year commitments, we are getting a jump-start on 2018 giving.

This spring, consulting pastor Zip Long will be on hand to help us continue our progress. Watch for more details on his visit to FUMC in the April *Carillon*.

Along with our pastors and staff, the whole *Into a New Era* team of congregation members is grateful for the tremendous support of our church through our prayers, presence, gifts, service and witness. We ask that you continue to pray this prayer daily: *Lord, what do you want to do through me at First United Methodist Church?*
