Have you noticed the beautiful garden on the northeast side of our church building? How about the beautifully curved wall that draws the eye to the stone walls representing Hope, Faith and Love? This sacred place on our church grounds is David's Garden and our church Columbarium.

Just what is a Columbarium?

"Columbarium" is the name given to a vault which contains a series of niches, each of which holds the ashes of one or two people who are cremated at death. For centuries, Christians have brought their loved ones to the church to be buried at death in the churchyard cemetery. Our Columbarium provides the same scared resting place. Such action gives testimony to our faith in God who created us and loves us, and to whom each of us returns at death.

The purposes of the Columbarium are:

- To provide a secure and sacred place for the deposit of cremains
- To honor loved ones on a Remembrance Wall
- To provide an environment of peace and beauty for meditation

The Remembrance Walls offer yet another option to be a permanent part of the fabric of our church. These are options that allow our genealogy to be preserved in the place we have called our church home.

Why Observe Lent Before Easter?

Lent is a time for spiritual reflection, for prayer, and for individual introspection. John Wesley was methodical in reviewing each day and asking how to better serve God. Here are several ways to observe a disciplined Lenten season.

First, if you have not attended the classes on Wednesdays at 5:30 p.m. during Lent, I invite you to come. The evening begins with a light meal in the parlor or fellowship hall (depending on availability). The children have an interactive art class, and adults can choose from the *Darkwood Brew* series with topics like uncertainty and loneliness viewed from a theological perspective or the book, *Convictions*, by Marcus Borg with some surprising ideas from this well-known author. For youth, the regular Wednesday evening small groups are in session.

Second, in worship, our congregation is engaged in a series that runs up to Palm Sunday. It is called "Why Be a Christian in the 21st Century?" We look at questions about being spiritual and religious, being a believing Christian, belonging to a faith community, believing as a Wesleyan-Methodist Christian, and finally, "What's In It for Me?" I invite you to be present every Sunday and discover (or re-discover) your calling and connection with God in Jesus Christ.

Third, I invite you to establish a deeper faith through basic spiritual practices. Here are some possibilities.

- Find a quiet place to pray and pray with disciplined regularity.
- Find a busy place to pray for the world in all its activity and vibrancy.
- Browse the Northern Colorado Faith Library and check-out a book for devotional reading and soul care.
- Join a Sunday School class or weekly Bible study to continue growing in faith through Lent and when Lent ends.
- Name something to give up for Lent. Choose something more important than chocolate or meats. Instead, consider giving up something you need never take up again when Lent concludes. (For example, give up hatred, gossip, prejudice, selfishness, etc.)
- Make the decision to be a committed disciple of Jesus Christ by (in addition to prayers and presence illustrated above) giving financially to God's work, giving time in mission and service to God's purposes, and telling friends, neighbors, companions, colleagues, and family members the richness of God's transformative work.

On Ash Wednesday (February 10th), the congregation was invited to "observe a holy Lent" in preparation for the coming commemorations of Jesus' passion and resurrection. To experience a meaningful 40 days of Lent leads us to a surprising Easter Day.

Snappy the Crab Wants You to Save the Date!



Purpose

One Great Hour of Sharing is an offering in Protestant churches in America that makes the love of Christ real for individuals and communities around the world who suffer the effects of disaster, conflict, or severe economic hardship. Today, projects are underway in more than 100 countries, including the United States and Canada.

History

During World War II and immediately following, Protestant churches made appeals for relief & reconstruction efforts. In 1949, church leaders from several denominations formed an ad hoc committee to organize an appeal aimed at supporting the separate campaigns of American church-

es. In 1950, the title "One Great Hour of Sharing" was used for the first time. Around the world, One Great Hour of Sharing continues to respond to needs equally critical as when it was first created.

UMCOR

The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) has brought hope, solidarity, support, and expertise to communities both at home and abroad in the wake of disaster. UMCOR enhances human dignity through food, shelter, health and peace projects in the United States and in 81 countries around the world. First United Methodist Church will be having a special offering, One Great Hour of Sharing, on Sunday, March 6, 2016 to underwrite UMCOR's costs of doing business, including such expenses as facilities, salaries, electricity, gas, & telephone. This allows UMCOR to keep its promise to send 100% of designated funds (such Clean Water Project in Kenya-Advance # 3021424—to which our own Rich Fisher gives so much time & effort) to the specific causes because the basic expenses of UMCOR are covered. Any extra OGHS funds and other undesignated gifts made throughout the year are used to support under-funded programs, or to allow UMCOR to respond to disasters immediately after an event and before funds can be raised. Church Foundation Announces Grant Program 2016

The Fort Collins First United Methodist Church Foundation is pleased to announce that its annual Grant Program is about to begin. Since its founding in 1986, the Foundation has given a total of over \$300,000 in annual grant money to various church committees and other groups for programs, equipment and services that are not funded in the annual budget, the results of which are both visible within our church walls as well as reaching out to impact the world around us.

Grant Application Timeline:

March 7th: Pick Up

Grant Applications made available in the church office. Applications will also be placed in committee mailboxes in the office.

April 4th: Deadline

Completed Grant Applications must be returned to the church office and placed in the Foundation's mailbox.

April 27th: Review

The Foundation Board will review all applications and determine this year's annual grant recipients.

May 2nd - May 4th: Notifications

All who applied for a Foundation grant will be notified as to the final status of their application.

While the Foundation would like to fully fund all grant requests, generally the total amount requested for all grants far exceeds available funds. The Foundation Board will review each application and determine if the request should be fully funded, partially funded or not funded.

Each Grant Application requires signature approval. All specified signatures must be obtained prior to the application being submitted to the Foundation. Applications lacking the required approvals will not be considered for funding.

No future is secure unless it is built on the gifts and graces God has brought together among us. Pastor Charles and I are praying about what we heard in the Listening Circles so that we can honor what you value as we move forward.

We ask that you support our congregation with your prayers during the season of Lent. With the Apostle Paul we pray "that the eyes of your heart will have enough light to see what is the hope of God's call, what is the richness of God's glorious inheritance among believers, and what is the overwhelming greatness of God's power that is working among us believers. This power

is conferred by the energy of God's powerful strength." (Ephesians 1:18-19)

After Easter we will begin the process of conferring together about the future of this church. We will do this in the form of Discussion Circles. Each Discussion Circle will focus on just one topic (such as worship, finances, children, facility, etc.). And, while we will retain the opening process of prayer and a brief time of uninterrupted sharing that we used in the Listening Circles, the greatest amount of time will be used to talk and listen to one another about the named topic. We trust that over time God's light will reveal what is to be our new "glorious inheritance."




