Message from Melanie

nce a week for five weeks about 30 people in our church gathered to discuss the book *Tired of Apologizing for a Church I Don't Belong To* by Rev. Lillian Daniel. It is a thought provoking book. She describes the type of people who have been alienated, hurt or bored by the church, and their number is growing. She also addresses the everincreasing group of the Nones. As defined by the Pew Research Center, the Nones are those who describe themselves as having no religious affiliation at all. Yet in many cases, they are spiritually curious, longing for connection and community, and they do find their way to church occasionally. We are fortunate that every single week visitors attend First Church, and they run the gamut from familiarity with the faith to having no faith at all.

I am very curious as to what their experience is when they visit our church. Are they warmly welcomed and inspired? What overriding message do we convey through our worship, hospitality, and relationships? Does any of this matter to an outsider? If so, why? Do we behave as if we know the God we claim to worship? Do we make that God seem appealing and worth knowing?

As we move into our next season of ministry, I am confident that a promising future is possible for a church like ours. It will depend upon how much we are willing to risk, adapt, and understand those who may not share our assumptions and traditions. It will depend upon how we are able to connect with those who visit our church and those who never will. It will be about relationship building, listening, and offering evidence of lives transformed for the good. We will be in uncharted territory.

While we do need to reach those outside of our church, the fact is that more folks will be visiting us as we approach Holy Week and Easter. Please be attentive to the newcomers in our midst and seek out someone you do <u>not</u> know before you catch up with those you do. Consider how hard it is to visit a church for the first time, which can be a bewildering and lonely experience. As a District Superintendent, I visited many churches and found some to be terribly unwelcoming, more like private clubs than the body of Christ. Those folks were endlessly kind to each other, but had no interest in welcoming a stranger who might need some support and kindness, as well.

As we move toward the great festival of Easter let us remember that we are about new life, and so many people are desperate for new life. Let us be passionate about living as if the Christian story has made a tangible difference in our lives. In the words of Rev. Daniel: "...religious communities are varied, rich and changing, but still way too much of a secret. I wish more people knew how good religious community can be when it is reasonable, rigorous and real." Let us share the secret about what a wonderful and promising community of faith this is.

We happily gather the third Saturday of each month in the Parlor from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m.as we work on shawls to be given to those in need of comfort and care as well as those who would like to use the shawls when they pray. Prayer Squares are available at the Welcome Center, at the Kids' Closet, and are given to children who attend Vacation Bible School.

Frequently Asked Questions:

Do I need to know how to knit or crochet? Beginners are welcome. We have willing hands to guide you, needles ready, and lovely yarns from which to choose. Beginners often start by creating small Prayer Squares.

Must I commit to attend every monthly knit-in? You may work from home, but we do have such good camaraderie at our monthly knit-ins that you may become reluctant to miss.

Are the shawls only for our church members? Shawls are lovingly and freely given to anyone who has a need for caring and comfort. Please contact the church office to choose a shawl for someone in need.

Is this ministry only for women? Anyone is welcome—young, old, women, men, boys, and girls. We are always open to new friends joining us. Watch the Sunday bulletins for details about monthly Knit -ins.


Discovering Spiritual Transformation.

Foundation Announces 2018 Grant Program

The 2018 Grant Program of the Foundation for the First United Methodist Church of Fort Collins will begin March 1. Grant money is available for church committees and groups for programs, equipment and services that are typically not funded through the church operating budget. The Foundation was begun in 1986 and has distributed approximately \$350,000 in grant money since that time.

Grant Application Timeline

March 1-30: Grant applications may be picked up in the church office. Applications will also be placed in committee mailboxes.

March 30 Deadline: Completed grant applications must be returned to the church office with the necessary signatures and placed in the Foundation mailbox.

April 25 Review: The Foundation Board will review each application and determine this year's grant recipients.

May 2-4 Notification: Grant applicants will be notified as to the status of their application.

The Foundation Board will review each application to determine if the request should be fully funded, partially funded, or not funded. In general, the total amount requested for all grants far exceeds the funds available.

Each grant application requires signature approval and the signatures must be obtained prior to submission to the Foundation. Unsigned applications will not be considered for funding.


