Those serving in this capacity are expected to be Christian leaders of high moral character, who are actively involved in our ministry and support the staff and mission of the church.

Message from Dr. Melanie Rosa, Lead Pastor

I majored in History in college, and it has always fascinated me to learn about those who have gone before us and the forces that shaped their lives. No less fascinating is the history of this congregation. It was 1867 when a Methodist circuit preacher organized a Methodist "class" of believers, the very first of the denominations to organize in Fort Collins. From this class our church was born. When Rev. G.W. Swift assumed a full-time pastorate in 1869, it became an official congregation. The church and community grew quickly and Colorado Agricultural College (CSU) was founded the following year, with the city of Fort Collins becoming incorporated in 1873. Our church is appropriately named, since we really were the first church in Fort Collins.



This burgeoning congregation continued to grow in a variety of different locations, attracting diverse people eager to connect, worship, learn and serve. First meeting in homes, then in a modest wood building at the corner of Mason and Laporte, to the "Old Grout" building at Linden and Jefferson, to Mountain Avenue, then College and Olive, and finally to Stover and Elizabeth. You can see pictures of these structures in the History booklet that church member Kathy Kuenzer wrote for us. It is an impressive history, and it is humbling to think of the sacrifice, service, and faithfulness of those who preceded us in this ministry. We have a sacred responsibility to honor their legacy by creating a vibrant faith community for our current congregation and for future generations.

I believe we have been called together for a time such as this. I believe that even with the decline of mainline Protestantism, there is still a need and a niche for a church like ours. A church that is intelligent, inclusive, missional and committed to sharing the love of Jesus Christ with people who are starved for connection, meaning, and a hope beyond themselves. I believe that with God's help and your continued support, we can flourish as we invite our neighbors experience God's presence today. It is going to be a great year, and it will be fun to share this 150th birthday with all of you.

n Wednesday, December 5, a mission team from First Church packed up 14 turkeys, 2 hams, and the makings of a Christmas dinner and headed to the Retreat Center on the Pine Ridge Reservation in South Dakota. On Thursday we visited old friends from previous trips to Pine Ridge, Red Cloud School, and the site of the Wounded Knee battle. Later in the afternoon we helped entertain 56 children with games and reading. Friday we prepared a buffet dinner for about 50 people from families involved in the Retreat Center programs. Gifts including baby blankets, hats, mittens, and gift cards donated by First Church members were distributed. Meanwhile 100 complete dinners with turkey, dressing, mashed potatoes, gravy, cranberry sauce, candied yams, corn, carrots,



and pumpkin pie were distributed to whomever came to the door. Everyone seemed very pleased with the celebration and me made new friends including the Lakota workers at the Retreat Center who helped serve the dinners

Children & Family Ministry Programming 2018-2019

Sunday Morning:

Nursery at all services-infant-6 years old

9:30 am service- This is our main service for Children's programming. We offer Sunday school classes for 3 year old's (by September 15th of 2018) through 5 years of age. If your child is Kindergarten-4th grade they will join us after the children's message upstairs in the Theater room for our large group gathering. After large group, we will break up according to grades for more small group God time. If your child is a 5th or 6th grader, join us in the youth wing for Club 56 at 9:30 sharp.

On the first Sunday of the month, we offer our fun and interactive **First Kids Club** for Kindergarten-6th grade. After the children's message in the Sanctuary, join us in the Theater room for fun and games. We will deliver your child back to the Sanctuary at the start of communion so that they may partake in communion with you. If your child is a preschooler, they may stay in the service or be checked in at the nursery.

Sunday Evening:

During our Sunday evening Modern Service, children are welcome and encouraged to stay at the service. 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Adult Faith Formation

artha Conant will facilitate a new course on Christian mindfulness to lead off the new year of Adult Faith Formation Wednesday evening offerings at 7 p.m. from Jan. 23 through Feb. 20.

According to Dr. Amy Oden in her book *Right Here, Right Now*, Christian mindfulness is a simple awareness of Divine presence, here and now. It is a way to abide in Christ. In this five-week class, we'll trace the roots of Christian mindfulness and explore many methods of mindfulness practice for both individuals and communities. There will be plenty of opportunity to try the practices suggested by Oden. The book written by this year's Hagen Lecturer costs \$12.



A study of John Pavlovitz's 2017 book, *A Bigger Table: Building Messy, Authentic and Hopeful Spiritual Community*, will run concurrently at 7 p.m. and at noon on Wednesdays for five weeks.

No one likes to eat alone; to approach a table filled with people only to be told that despite the open chairs there isn't room for you. Yet that's exactly what the church has been saying to far too many people for far too long, says Pavlovitz. David Reid leads this study. Cost of the book is \$12.

eveloping an "exit strategy" is the focus of a half-day class that will be offered by Rev. Linda J. Battello on Jan. 24.

A retired UMC clergywoman from the Nebraska Annual Conference who is an active participant at First Church, she has offered such classes in other locations for many years and is passionate about the need for people of all ages to be prepared for medical disability or death. Being unprepared can have devastating and lasting effects on any family, she said.

Recommended reading is *Being Mortal: Medicine and What Matters in the End* by Atul Gawande. Books are available for \$11 at the Adult Faith Formation table. (A copy of the book and the audio book are available in the Northern Colorado Faith Library.)

The class, which will run from 8 a.m. to noon in the Parlor, will cover:

when to start preparing – assessing your place in the journey of life and how to talk about living and dying;

making decisions – determining in advance who will make medical decisions and how often to review your plan;

paperwork matters - wills, durable power of attorney, living wills, final instructions, who to

notify and caring for your family; and

Biomedical ethics.

nited Methodist Men's Bible Study meets at 6:30 a.m. Thursdays at *The Egg and I*, 2809 S College, Fort Collins. Currently, the group is studying the Acts of the Apostles.

Our dynamic includes *lively discussion* such as whether Jesus was a Zealot (from the book of the same name by Reza Aslan). Several *probing questions* pop up during our study, such as:

What is love? There is a search for meaning: "If I believe this, what does it mean for my actions?" These questions and discussions help us to think and rethink our relationship to Christ, to Christ's church and to our human interactions. We openly and honestly share our Christian faith and life experiences.

We welcome all who would like to attend. This past summer a person visiting family in Fort Collins joined us. After attending worship at First Church on his first Sunday in Fort Collins, he inquired of Rev. Cynthia if there were any study groups that would welcome him. She referred him to us. Human Relations Day Offering

he Human Relations Day offering on Jan 20, the Sunday before Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. day, calls United Methodists to recognize the right of all God's children to realize their potential as human beings in relationship with one another. Drawing heavily on Mathew 25, the offering benefits neighborhood ministries through the Community Development Program (57%), community advocacy through United Methodist Voluntary Services (33%), and work with at-risk teens through the Youth Offender Rehabilitation Program (10%). For example, the "Amachi," Program, a Nigerian Ibo word that means, "Who knows but what God has brought us through this child?" Grants have helped the program (led by United Methodist Men) match adults with children whose parents are in prison. It is a way to change a trend in which 70 percent of children of incarcerated parents later go to prison. More information is available at Church and Society table in Fellowship Hall.
