The phrase "It's always darkest before the dawn" is credited to Thomas Fuller, an English theologian. Living in Alaska for over 40 years, I know about winter darkness. This past year we experienced a period of physical, emotional, and social "darkness" that was just as profoundly dark as the night skies of the Arctic in midwinter. In the furthest north native village of Utqiagvik (formerly Barrow) Alaska, people have to wait 65 days for the sun to return after it sets in November. They don't worry that it won't return. They have faith that it will return, because it always has. When the sun does return in January, there is a great celebration. Faith is an important part of our spiritual health. During the "darkest" times in our lives is when we must rely on our faith the most. So be like the villagers in Utqiagvik: hunker down during the "dark "times, wait patiently, help each other, and have faith. Take care and stay safe!

Support - We are thankful to all who helped support our efforts to provide a Habitat home for Becky and Ember. Through the generosity of our members First Church raised \$61,207.74. In addition to the many individual donations, this included a bake sale on February 2nd that raised more than \$5,000 and 2 bookshelf building events in September led by Cindi Ross-Bell and Bonny Thomas. Cindi also led our planning committee with the following members: Jim Collinson, Laura Davis, Pam Davis, Rich Fisher, Keith Metcalf, Cynthia Paquette, and Bonny Thomas. Owing to restrictions because of the pandemic, we were limited to a small number of volunteers on the build site on a given day. Builders were Jim Collinson, Laura Davis, Rich Fisher, Don Gaymon, Jeff and Sarah Johnson and their daughter Kate, Marilyn Pullin, David McCowen, David Rubenthaler and his daughter Kristin, and Don Silar. Becky Ailor worked with us on several occasions while earning her "sweat equity."

Pantry - We have been asked by Habitat whether we will be helping fill Becky's pantry as we did after we sponsored the Garza home in 2009. Please leave items in the bin outside the east entrance near the Chapel on January 4th and 8th. A custodian will bring the items inside each evening.

Therefore, below is a list of suggested items.

Acceptable:

Nonperishable food (canned goods, boxed goods, treats for children). Popular items are macaroni and cheese, peanut butter, applesauce, soups, vegetables, cake mixes, baking staples like flour and spices, etc.

Nonperishable cleaning supplies (laundry soap, dish soap, paper towels, toilet cleaner, etc.)

Nonperishable toiletry supplies (toilet paper, toothpaste, etc.)

Other (indoor plants, tin foil, waxed paper, Ziploc baggies, plastic storage containers, etc.)

Handmade quilts or framed photos are acceptable and appreciated, especially if they are from their home's sponsor.

Not Acceptable:

Money

Any item worth more than \$5-\$10 (except for the handmade items listed above)

Items that a family would already have or want to choose for themselves (small kitchen appliances, kitchen towels, decorations, etc.).

All activities are planned as online meetings using Zoom technology.



Sandy Merriweather will facilitate a study of *Wild Mercy: Living the Fierce and Tender Wisdom of the Women Mystics* by Mirabai Starr at 7 p.m. Wednesdays beginning January 13. This weekly class for women – and men— is scheduled to conclude February 10. Hardback \$11.60, e-book \$9.

Best-selling author and Episcopal priest Barbara Brown Taylor says of *Wild Mercy*: "This is so much more than a gorgeously written book. It is an act of divine redemption, in which Mirabai Starr gives voice to every true and secret longing of the human heart.

Whoever you are, whatever you thought you knew about how the Holy looks or acts, get ready to be loved into deeper reality by someone you can trust to show you the way."



AFF Director David Reid and Rev. Cynthia Paquette will each lead sessions in a six-week study of *The Bible With and Without Jesus: How Jews and Christians Read the Same Stories Differently*. This Thursday evening study runs January 14, 21, 28 and February 4, 11 and 18. The schedule will be supplemented with a Thursday noon study on the same dates if demand warrants.



Bible scholars Amy-Jill Levine and Marc Zvi Brettler take readers on a guided tour of numerous Hebrew Bible stories referenced in the New Testament to reveal what the ancient texts meant in their original contexts and to show how and why the Jewish and Christian traditions find very different meanings in them. Jesus and John Wayne: How White Evangelicals Corrupted a Faith and Fractured a Nation by Calvin College professor Kristin Kobes Du Mez was named Book of the Year by Englewood Review of Books. Reid will lead this study at 7 p.m. on Thursdays from February 18 through March 18. Hardback \$29, e-book \$15.



Pastor Bob Simpson will lead our Lenten study of the just released Adam Hamilton book and video *Words of Life: Jesus and the Promise of the Ten Commandments Today.* The evening group will meet weekly during Lent. Hamilton explores how the latest research in science and psychology illuminates these commandments, rightly understood, as a way of ordering one's life beautifully in the present day.


wonderful event happen!
