A MESSAGE FROM REV. BRAD

“Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin.” (Matthew 6:28)

The leaves are changing. Their splendid colors dazzle us until the wind takes them away. Soon we will hear their crunch under our feet. And before we know it, we will be raking them into piles. It is a moment in which the movement of the seasons becomes vivid and obvious. The thought of bare tree limbs and branches is not typically an inspiring image, but what is happening within the trees is an example for us all.

Genesis tells us God brought forth all the vegetation with love and care. Biologists tell us that millennia of adaptation have made trees resilient and efficient. Trees’ ways of being can be instructional for us. So what are we to learn from their release of foliage?

First, seasons are part of life. No one judges a tree for its changes in appearance and ability, it is simply part of being a tree. We, too, move through times in life where we experience changes in our relationship with the world around us, yet we often do not offer ourselves grace.

Another part of being a tree in autumn is the intentional preparation for difficult times. Drawing resources into supportive places, minimizing the effort it will take to make it through, and not leaving themselves open to the weight of potential snow on their leaves. When we see difficult moments approach, how might we take time to care for ourselves? Too often, self care is viewed as selfish, but trees are not selfish. If they did not care for themselves the ecosystem would be in shambles - birds and squirrels with no where to live, shade and protection denied to smaller vegetation. To care for one’s self, when it is not at anyone else’s expense, is to recognize the interdependence of our lives. Caring for yourself is an investment in your communities.

The wisdom of trees goes far beyond these points. One could consider how in releasing leaves they are returning nutrients to the ground. One could wax poetic on the idea that without releasing leaves, there would be no place for new growth. We have much to learn from the deeply rooted lives of the trees we walk by every day.

This autumn, take a moment to sit and truly see the trees. Don’t just look at them, see them for all they have to teach us. For in their creation and life we can find wisdom for our own.

If you are wondering what you might learn in community organizing training at First Church on October 28-29, listen to Rev. Brad Laurvick's August 21 sermon titled, "Let Me Tell You a Story."

I took away two major points. The first is that oral storytelling was and still is a primary means of sharing meaning, values and a sense of place. Stories of other people shape us, and Jesus shaped people by responding with stories nearly every time someone asked him a question.

"God's story is one of relationship and covenant, redemption and grace, faithfulness and presence," said Rev. Brad.

The second point is that Jesus told stories because people were not very good at listening.

Matthew 13:13 quotes Jesus saying, "This is why I speak to the crowds in parables; although they see, they don't really see; and although they hear, they don't really hear or understand."

Professional organizers have mastered the skill of being curious about other people. They are expert at active listening and discerning what matters most in people's lives.

That's a skill that anyone who desires to be a leader could use and it is at the heart of this training.
