First Church's 2nd Annual COMMUNITY NIGHTS ON THE LAWN

First Church's second annual Community Nights on the Lawn will extend all the way to Eastside Neighborhood Park this summer, with the August program scheduled there. Here's the schedule for events in June, July and August that will be hosted by Adult Faith Formation and Welcoming, Hospitality and Discipleship.

The format is the same as last year for the June and July events: Bring something to grill, bring something to share and bring something to sit on. Drinks will be provided. Dinner is 5:30 to 6:30. The program starts at 6:30.

In case of rain, the three events will go on as scheduled, with grilling in a protected area and the programs moved to an inside location in the church.



June 6: Rev. Kimberly Salico-Diehl will lead off with a storytelling event titled, "Love Fest: Love Letters, Love Stories and Love Songs."

The three stories are somewhat personal will take you to places of sadness and humor, said Salico-Diehl, who was installed as pastor of the American Baptist Church, 600 S. Shields St., Fort Collins, last fall.

She holds a Master of Divinity degree from Andover Newton Theological School and a Master of Music in piano performance from State University of New York. She also serves as the congregation's pianist and often writes original songs for worship.

Co-sponsor for the June 6 event is Faith Libraries of Northern Colorado, a network of libraries that includes those at American Baptist Church, Clearwater Church, First Presbyterian Church, Plymouth Congregational United Church of Christ, and the Northern Colorado

Faith Library at First Church.

July 11: Community game night will feature an array of board games, music and other attractions. Feel free to bring your own board game if you have a favorite. Everyone will be encouraged to try at least one of the board games and other activities such as cornhole.

Look for updates on music and other attractions as details become available. This will be a very informal evening.

August 6: This event will be held at Eastside Neighborhood Park, 100 E. Locust St., a 12-minute walk from First Church. The church has submitted a proposal to sponsor the Neighborhood Night Out event, which is popular in many Fort Collins neighborhoods, but which has not been held in Eastside for the last four years.

We'll get under way at 7 p.m. with an ice cream social. At sunset, 8:10 p.m., we'll screen the animated movie, *The Lorax*, which runs an hour and a half.

As previously announced, First Church plans to work with the city to make improvements to this park as our gift to the city that has been our home for 150 years. The city's Parks Planning Department conducted an input meeting with neighbors and church members in February and the church will sponsor a workday based at the park on Oct. 19.

Parking is limited at Eastside Park. We may provide a shuttle service from the church that night. We're working with the city to see if folding chairs can be provided.



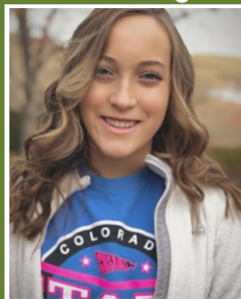
Memorials Committee Update

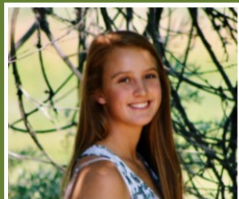

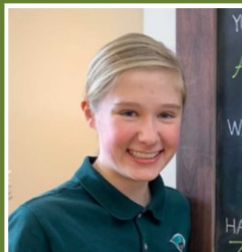

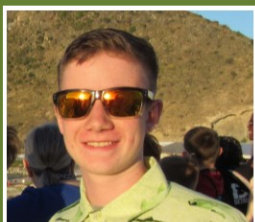

In the fifth century B.C. the historian Herodotus wrote about the seven wonders of the Ancient World. These wonders were a celebration of human religion, art, mythology and accomplishment. Some of them did not survive into the Middle Ages (only one survives to this day) yet they were impressive enough to be listed as wonders by ancient peoples. The seven wonders of the Ancient World were: The Great Pyramid of Giza, The Hanging Gardens of Babylon, The Statue of Zeus at Olympia, The Temple of Artemis at Ephesus, The Mausoleum at Halicarnassus, The Colossus of Rhodes, and The Lighthouse of Alexandria. - Time commitment can vary, but it's minimally 1-2 hours per month.

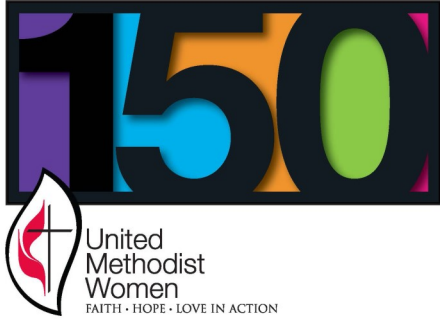

Changes to the Grocery Card Program

King Soopers' donation to the Church and United Methodist Women has changed. They will no longer be giving us a discount for Grocery Gift Cards. They are still supporting our organization through your Loyalty Card, Alternate Number, or Key Tag. This is the one you give them at the store for discounts and use for gas points.

You can get these free at the store if you do not have one. Make sure it is registered with an email address and password. You can register them at the Service Desk in the store or by calling 1-800-576-4377.

Then you must enroll on line at www.kingsoopers.com/communityrewards using this email and password. If you do not have a computer or do not think you can do it, you can have someone do it for you using your email and password. You also may come to the Grocery Card Table on Sundays where there will be a computer and someone to help you.

When you enroll you will be asked to choose an organization to contribute to. The number they have given us is SB653. This number will take you directly to Fort Collins First UMW-EOM group. You can only sign up for one organization under your email address. The card can still be used for discount, gas points, etc..

We still have some King Sooper grocery gift cards available at the grocery card table in Fellowship Hall on Sundays. These will still help our organization and are good to use, but if you refill them they no longer give us a percentage of these.

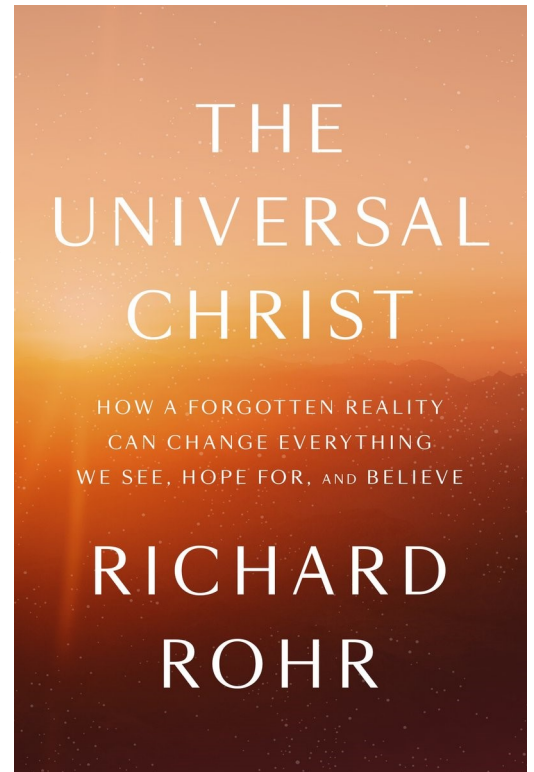


Adult Faith Formation

Dr. Melanie Rosa will lead a four-part study on Tuesdays in July of the new book from Richard Rohr, one of the world's most influential spiritual thinkers. The study of *The Universal Christ: How a Forgotten Reality Can Change Everything We See, Hope for, and Believe*, is scheduled for noon in the Parlor on July 9, 16, 23 and 30.

Drawing on scripture, history, and spiritual practice, Rohr articulates a transformative view of Jesus Christ as a portrait of God's constant, unfolding work in the world. "God loves things by becoming them," he writes, and Jesus' life was meant to declare that humanity has never been separate from God—except by its own negative choice. When we recover this fundamental truth, faith becomes less about proving Jesus was God and more about learning to recognize the Creator's presence all around us and in everyone we meet.

Thought-provoking, practical, and full of deep hope and vision, *The Universal Christ* is a landmark book, and an invitation to contemplate how God liberates and loves all that is.



Financial Peace University

Our church is interested in helping people with every area of their lives, to find the peace of mind and freedom that God intends for us all. Yet 76% of people live paycheck to paycheck and 24% of their paycheck is spent paying off debt. The average household debt is made up of approximately \$187k mortgage, \$30k student loans, \$17k car loan, and \$5k credit card debt. This is nearly a quarter million dollars of debt. Would you be interested in an approach that has helped nearly 100% of 5 million people pay off their debt, save \$2,700, and create an emergency fund of \$1,000 in 90 days?

Our Stewardship and Generosity Team will sponsor Financial Peace University this fall. Participants do not need to be members of the church, since we hope to better help the entire Fort Collins community by being more active in serving all those who are struggling with their finances, which if we're honest, includes almost all of us.

It will begin on Wednesday Sept. 11 at 7 p.m. and end on Nov. 6 and will be held in the second floor Village Commons room. Each session includes a 1-hour video and a half hour for discussion.

Cost will be \$109 per family (single person or a couple with or without children under 17). Scholarships to reduce your portion of the fee are available to offset costs if the fee is outside your ability to pay.
