

Why I Give by Pastor Charles

In weeks before Christmas, our congregation's leaders mailed a letter containing initial information about our stewardship emphasis on January 3rd and 10th. In the December letter, everyone in First United Methodist Church was asked to pray about making his/her/their best gift. As 2016 begins, we can choose to be faithful stewards with every gift God has entrusted to us. The January 3rd theme promotes stewardship as it relates to time and talents, and the January 10th focus encourages financial faithfulness. Throughout this edition of the Carillon, some of the leaders of our congregation offer a few words on the topic "Why I Give." Below is a brief essay written by Donnis Broman. Her thoughts on "Why I Give" provide an excellent beginning.

My first memories of giving to the church was when I was quite small and attending Sunday school. I placed my coins in the offering plate the teacher passed around the table. I remember feeling good about it and thinking giving seems important. I have very fond memories of Bible school in early June each year. I remember I always took a bouquet of lilacs to the teacher. To this day, when I smell lilacs, I think of Bible school and the fond memories of time spent with friends under the gentle guidance of a caring teacher.

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My paternal grandmother died when I was in junior high. Her memorials were directed to our church. Some of the money went to purchase a sterling silver coffee and tea set for the women of the church to use at wedding and funeral receptions. That set was used at my wedding reception some ten years later. Thirteen years later, my maternal grandmother died, her funeral was at the church and there was the coffee and tea service again! I remember thinking how wonderful it was that money my grandmother had given to the church had come back to touch me personally.

My parents pledged to help build an educational wing onto our century old church in the 1960s. It was an ambitious project considering our congregation was small. I remember my parents discussing how much money they thought they could pledge and they dutifully paid their pledge over several years. I remember feeling their sense of pride as the new building opened and we toured it. The Sunday school classes now had bright and airy rooms. These rooms served myself, my brother and sister and now my nieces and nephews.

Thirty years later, my husband and I pledged to help build the educational wing here at First United Methodist, and we purchased bonds to help do so. Our three children have all benefited from this addition, and now we see young families and their children filling the halls and rooms.

My mother taught Sunday school and served on various committees at our church over the years. I have to say, her favorite volunteering was with the Women's Fellowship. Her favorite project was the annual cookie walk that they sponsored. She would bake for days and donate dozens of cookies. Proceeds raised benefited the church's mission. My mother loved the sense of community, the sense of family within the church. Last year, my mother died after spending over two years in a memory unit. Towards the end of her life, she no longer recognized us and was essentially nonverbal. She lived in a facility that had been built by the Lutheran church a number of years ago, and it had a beautiful chapel. My brother would take her to service on Sunday, and he told us that when it came time to recite the Lord's Prayer, my mother would recite the prayer along with the rest of the congregation. Words she had learned over eighty years earlier were so ingrained in her memory that not even dementia could steal them from her.

I give to the church for those who went before me and provided for me. I give for my children and the children of others so they might have a foundation in the Christian faith. I give for those children yet to be born so that they may be provided the opportunity to learn and grow in their faith.

I see now the legacy that was left me. It was a legacy of caring, a legacy of love and a legacy of hope for the future. I feel a desire and an obligation to continue building upon what those who went before me began.

What's Next in the Interim Process?

Last fall the Transition Team arranged for Pastor Charles and I to lead ten "Listening Circles" comprised of about 15 people in each circle. During the Circle time each person spoke about what drew them to the church, what keeps them involved here, and what their hopes and dreams are for the church. The circles are constructed so that each person is given at least one minute to speak per topic, and all listen without interrupting. Everyone has a chance to say what's on their minds except Pastors Charles and I, who simply listen.

It has been fascinating to learn about our church in this way. Some common themes are emerging from the Circles, and each Circle has several points of view that are unique. The faithfulness of our people is strikingly evident, and it is clear the Holy Spirit is moving within and among us bringing a sense of hope and renewal.

One thing has become clear to all who have participated thus far: they didn't really know what others thought and felt about the church. At the start of this process many people thought that they had a good idea of what others in the church knew and what opinions were generally held. But we have all been surprised at what we've learned during these gentle listening times.

"Listening Circles" will resume this month, and continue for several months more. But there is more to the interim process than listening, so later in the spring we will move into the next phase of the process: discernment. Discernment is about more than making decisions about what to do as a church. It is the time when we listen to God's deep desire for our church and come together to create a way to live into that call.

During the discernment process we will be in prayer together, then move into a time of conversation. Those conversations will be held in small groups so we continue to really listen to one another. Depending on where God leads us, we may form small groups to study various issues or new ways of being church in today's culture. That information will, in turn, call us into more prayer and continued conversations.

Ultimately, God's leading will begin to become clear as the Holy Spirit moves within the church so that "the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion" (Philippians 1:6). As we are drawn into clarity regarding God's will, we will shift our conversations about what we need to do in order to live into that calling. But that phase is a topic to be addressed in a future article for The Carillon. For now, move forward with hope based on the knowledge that God is steadfast in his love for this church.
