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From Dr. Melanie Rosa, lead pastor...

The Ringling Barnum and Bailey travelling circus has finally closed down for good. After 146 years its demise was in response to a prolonged slump in ticket sales that made their future unsustainable. Began in 1871 as PT Barnum's Grand travelling Museum and Menagerie, the Greatest Show On Earth had 500 performers, 100 animals, and always travelled via mile long trains. Before the very last show in New York Ringmaster John Iverson said, "The world is losing a place of wonder, the last pure and wholesome form of entertainment there is."

I remember attending the circus as a child with my parents, watching the elephants, lions, clowns, and the trapeze artists, who enchanted me most of all. They fearlessly leapt from one trapeze to another, to our astonished gasps. They did what seemed impossible, insane, and did it with grace and trust.

What lessons can we learn from trapeze artists? At times we must be willing to let go of that which is known and familiar. This is difficult, but letting go of some things is a prerequisite for embracing other things. It is essential for growth and new life. Occasionally we find ourselves suspended in a place of groundlessness. We all know the feeling of having our lives suddenly change, being weightless and vulnerable. We are called to embrace that sense of uncertainty with the hope that something good lies ahead. Finally, we must believe that a second trapeze will be there! This is what faith is all about, the capacity to trust. For those who trust in the invisible can do the impossible.

Living between trapezes can be unnerving, yet it can be a time of significant growth. We always live in between one place and another; human life is a process constantly unfolding. We are a pilgrim people. This is what our sermon series is about the next six weeks: living between trapezes, making the journey our home. We are moving into a new future together, sustained by God's grace. In this season of change let us trust that (unlike the travelling circus) our church has the potential to be a lasting and vibrant place of wonder, love, and praise.

Providing Water Supplies for Northern Colorado – Past, Present, and Future

If you ever attend our 11:00 worship service, you will probably see long time church member, Eric Wilkinson, on duty as usher, helping others as they come and go to that service. Eric was born and raised in the Fort Collins, attended CSU, and graduated in 1973 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Civil Engineering. We are so fortunate to have him as our speaker this month at the Double Nickel Senior Lunch on Friday, September 8 at 12:00 noon in the parlor – he is an expert on a topic that is of great importance to all of us, *Providing Water Supplies for Northern Colorado – Past, Present, and Future.*

Mr. Wilkinson has served as General Manager of the Northern Colorado Water Conservancy District (Northern Water) and its Municipal Sub district since January 1994. He has worked for Northern Water since 1987. From 1984 to 1987, he worked for the City of Greeley Water Department as a Water Resources Engineer. From 1973 to 1984, he was employed by the Colorado Division of Water Resources, Office of the State Engineer in the Dam Safety Branch. In 1972, he served as the Deputy Water Commissioner for the Cache la Poudre River.

In March 2000, Mr. Wilkinson was appointed as the South Platte Basin representative on the Colorado Water Conservation Board and served in that capacity until February 2012. In 2003 and in 2011, he served as Chairman of the Colorado Water Conservation Board. He served as one of two representatives of the South Platte Basin on the Interbasin Compact Committee (IBCC) from the creation of the IBCC in 2005 until December, 2015. In 2011 he was the recipient of the Aspinall Award, given annually in recognition of a career of service and contribution to Colorado's water community. Eric also serves on various advisory boards and committees and is on the Board of Directors of Colorado Water Congress.

We are so fortunate that he will be presenting to us at our September Double Nickel program. Don't miss this special program and another great \$4 lunch – the best \$4 lunch in town!

 designed to lead students into small-group accountability and discipleship. Students from all stages of

- Exodus in Seven Weeks (7-8:30 p.m.): Rev. Cynthia will offer this Bible study on the book of Exodus for seven weeks from Oct. 4 through Nov. 17.

World Wisdoms Project (WWP) will present its official debut program titled Improving the Dialogue Across Lines of Faith and Belief at 6:30 p.m. Sept. 12 in Fellowship Hall. World Wisdoms Project was formerly known as Theologian in Residence, an independent nonprofit that seeks to foster an interfaith conversation across the region. The new name reflects the type of boundary-crossing programing the organization has sponsored for several years.

WWP receives no funding from First Church or any other organization. A donation of \$10 per program is suggested.

The theme for WWP programing this academic year is "Experiencing the Sacred: Sharing Wisdom in Music, Art, Story." Additional events in the series this fall are:

- A World of Wisdom in Stories and Storytelling Oct. 17 at Trinity Lutheran Church, 301 E. Stuart St. Presenters are Kathy Santopietro-Weddel, author and storyteller; Cherie Karo Schwartz, storyteller; and Rob Elms, storyteller.
- **Music in End of Life Care** Nov. 7 in Fellowship Hall. Featured are Elaine Hild, musicologist; Beth Mosko, Pathways hospice; Lindsey Wilhelm, assistant professor of music therapy and coordinator of clinical practicum, CSU.
- Chant: Sounds of Faith, Joy and Hope Date and location to be determined.
