


Discovering Spiritual Transformation.

Stuart St. This will be one of the highlights of the academic year for World Wisdoms Project, an independent 501c3 that has been designated a ministry of First Church.

Jim Tolstrup, director of Shambala training, will offer Buddhist chant that prepares the mind for meditation. 

Online Advent Experiences

First Church will offer its first-ever online Advent experiences beginning December. 3.

Advent in 10 Minutes will provide participants with a link to a short video they can watch at any time each week during Advent. There will an opportunity to comment about the experience on a blog that will be available to all participants. There is no cost associated with this class.

Names for the Messiah is a study of the book written by Walter Brueggemann, who is the William Marcellus McPheeters Professor Emeritus of Old Testament at Columbia Theological Seminary. There will be no class meetings. Participants are encouraged to read a 15-page chapter each week and respond on a blog to prayers and study questions found in the back of the book. Cost of the book is \$11.
